
44th AFF Poster Artist: James Kelly

Alaskan artist James Kelly was recently chosen as the 44th annual Alaska Folk Fest poster artist. James grew up in Nome and Ketchikan, went to college in Fairbanks, and now calls Juneau his home. Through all of these unique, Alaskan geographies, James had a sketchbook in his hand. In Ketchikan, inspired by such artists as Ray Troll, Evon Zerbetz and Dave Rubin, James learned that early connection with paper could also extend to works in clay, dramatic self-produced VHS films, and stop frame animation. In Fairbanks, James pursued a degree in Art at the University of Alaska Fairbanks, and began to paint murals and hone his interest in graphic design.

James has an eye for the quirky and off-kilter side of Alaskan culture and geography. Whether it's riding fat tire bikes in the arctic snow, scavenging a Fairbanks Transfer Site (the local dump) or paddling around

Southeast Alaska, James is always looking to illustrate what surrounds him. James says: "Art doesn't have to mean anything, it just needs to be fun" His humorous and whimsical illustrations have been featured in numerous posters, logos, newspapers, t-shirts and stickers.

James now lives, works, and plays outdoors in Juneau with his wife Rachel. When he's not kayaking or biking, he is a graphic designer for the Juneau Empire and runs decaffeinated designs, a sticker and logo company.

A Cover Charge for Folk Fest?!?!?

In the early 1980's, Alaska Folk Festival organizers decided that the festival should be free of charge to all participants. What has evolved is a homegrown all-volunteer event with no paid staff (only the guest artist, chief and dance sound engineer, and guest dance caller are compensated), that encourages non-professional performers and the sharing of Alaska's most widely practiced art... home-made music.

The Alaska Folk Festival relies on membership dues, Pick.Click.Give donations, merchandise sales, and the generous donations of businesses and individuals to pay for festival costs and (in good years) set aside funds to support future events. There are no plans to sell tickets to Folk Fest or charge admission anytime soon, but that means we need your ongoing support to keep operations running smoothly and bring high-quality guest artists to Juneau.

Folk Festival News and Updates

Guest Artist Update

Many people who come to the Alaska Folk Festival as guest artists leave as friends and many of us in the audience follow their careers and listen to subsequent recordings. This fall, one of the guest artists from the Carolina Chocolate Drops (2007) made the news. Rhiannon Giddens is one of this year's MacArthur Foundation Fellows - yes, that's the "genius" grant which is given to "extraordinarily creative people who inspire us all". Ms. Giddens was recognized for "reclaiming African American contributions to folk and country music and bringing to light new connections between music from the past and the present".

Preserving our Heritage

Music is a part of Juneau's heritage and luckily our town has museums that protect important artifacts and documents. Last spring a frequent audience member approached the Folk Festival Board with a stack of festival programs that had been saved over the years.

Alaska Folk Festival member Anne Fuller checked the museums' holdings and now we can report that the Alaska State Museum's collection is complete. The Juneau Douglas City Museum now has 13 of the most recent programs in their files and they noted the donation in the newsletter this summer.

Many thanks to the anonymous longtime audience member who donated these programs. Hopefully in the future these will be displayed at the museums during the festival to commemorate the last 43 years of this important community event.

Dancing is a great way to experience music. In the early eighties, Folk Fest dances were held in the street. A few years later, there were dances in Centennial Hall after evening concerts finished. Maybe you remember hundreds dancing in a spiral to the klezmer music of Brave Old World in 1996. Michael Alpert, the bandleader that night, says he remembers that wonderful dance to this day. And for many years now, a group of volunteers have run Friday's Coffee and Jam, which is full of dancing.

We dance to live music in a variety of genres. During the festival, volunteers offer to teach you in workshops, to direct and call dances, and to play tunes that make you tap your toes. Please consider lending your talent, skills, and enthusiasm to the dancing part of the festival. Volunteer applications are made available several months before the festival and performer applications from dance musicians are also welcome.
